Please note that the current advice is that no school should close in response to a suspected (or confirmed) COVID-19 case unless directed to do so by Public Health England. Typical symptoms of coronavirus include fever and a cough that may

progress to a severe pneumonia causing shortness of breath and breathing difficulties. Generally, coronavirus can cause more severe symptoms in people with weakened immune systems, older people, and those with long-term conditions like diabetes, cancer and chronic lung disease.




Neurodiversity Week

Highlights of the visit included attending the remembrance service led by our accompanying soldiers, exploring reconstructed trenches and of course a visit to a French chocolate shop to stock up on some very tasty gifts.
