BASE1 went for a walk to find the fairy houses and enjoyed spending time at the park.


RISE2 \downarrow








RISE1 \downarrow

BASE 3's Walk


BASE3 learners took part in a walk to the canal and the nine arches viaduct where we were able to explore different elements of the physical and human environment as part of Geography.

and depart each day. Post-16 students planted their bulbs in the college garden and despite competition with some hungry squirrels our blooming crocuses have added to the wonderful display of colour. Post 16 students also completed horticultural work placements with Earlestown Cricket Club to help develop their sensory garden, plant more Rotarian crocuses and reinforce this very clear message about ending polio.

It has been national careers week this week and our supported intern, Will, has been hard at work. Some of his jobs, such as checking safety of the



minibuses every week and some of the other jobs such as cleaning the minibuses or moving furniture are done when they are needed to be done. Will says that he enjoys all these jobs and likes the variety in working in maintenance. He gets to do everything from footing a ladder to helping to move phone switches or checking equipment for safety. We, at Wargrave house, are working hard to support Will in learning all the skills he needs to be able to work independently and move into a role that he will enjoy. Some of the jobs that Will does are essential for the school, such as leaf blowing, setting up equipment or checking other equipment to make sure it is safe to use. Will doing these jobs not only supports the school but it supports the maintenance person as it frees them up to do other jobs around that school."

Post-16 National Careers Week

Students admire the work that has been done in conjunction with Earlestown Cricket Club as part of the work experience to maintain and develop the sensory garden.
