
Mixed Martial Arts: Meet the coach

What do you like about coming to Wargrave?

I like many things about Wargrave, one thing I love is how polite all the students are.

What are the students learning during your sessions?

I am teaching a curriculum in which all students can be successful. They can learn fitness based martial arts moves, whilst having fun and learning about my main martial art principles, which are: Focus, Respect, Confidence, Kindness, Resilience.

What's the best part of teaching martial arts in Wargrave? MMA Coach; Shireen

Seeing the students enjoying my classes and seeing how much their focus and confidence improves over each lesson.

What made you want to teach MA in Wargrave?

I have two children with autism. One who attends Wargrave. I noticed that my children started to thrive in confidence and resilience when I started teaching them martial arts but at the same time one of my children found it a bit tricky to keep up with the mainstream lessons I was teaching at the time, so I decided to set up an additional class, with an altered curriculum so that it suited everyone regardless of ability. From there I moved on to teaching MA in Wargrave.

What is a mat chat?

This is a time students can sit and rest for 5 minutes, whilst I talk about our "word of the week" which will be related to the main principles. Students get to tell me about how they have demonstrated the "word of the week" at school and at home. I love hearing all their examples!

Duke of Edinburgh

Well done to our Bronze Duke of Edinburgh students for all of their hard work on completing the three sections of their award! Each student worked hard in their chosen area during such a difficult time and will receive a certificate of recognition very soon! Bronze students have now begun training for their expedition This week we have been working identifying risks and hazards and how to keep safe

while enjoying the outdoors. BASE 3 & 4 students worked on safe road crossing techniques as a group, travelling on foot as a team and recognising and identifying dangerous plant life. All students continue to grow in skill and the team work and the support shown to one another throughout each session is exemplary.


















BASE3






Easter Fayre Plant Progress

Careers & Employability update


We will now be reviewing and evaluating the careers and employability programme to make the curricula activities, events and work placements even better for next year. One area that we will focus on is 'linking curriculum learning to careers' and we are working closely with the CEO of Primary Engineer which is an organisation that brings engineering and engineers into the classroom. Watch this space for a launch in the Autumn term!

Meanwhile, Post 16 students are putting the finishing touches to their Open Awards Skills for Further Learning and Employment and Travel Training portfolios. Despite the setbacks that we have endured due to COVID, students have worked extremely hard to complete their work that includes aspects of personal action planning and development, preparation for work, construction, horticulture/forestry, hospitality and travel training to name but a few.

LS1 continue to work at Earlestown Cricket Club. They managed to upcycle some old railway sleepers and have now drawn up the plans for their raised vegetable beds at Earlestown Cricket Club. This will provide fresh vegetables for the local foodbank and is part of a long-term project with LEAP and LS2.
