
BASE2

during P.E exploring and expanding our fitness circuit. We have also had sensory stories and exploring our senses and have been really engaged during our attention autism sessions.




BASE1 have been working hard on EHCP targets, including lanis practicing different emotions and Alex zipping up his coat!





We have also been learning numbers to 100, shown here by El-Jay and Omar. Omar even wrote all his numbers without needing prompts!










BASE1 have loved their weekly OT sessions with Karen and Laura-everyone has joined in and loved listening to the stories while doing the activities!
