














Christmas Dinners








Khovan's First Victory

Landfill Sites, Recycling, Waste & Contamination





A landfill site is an area of land that is used to dump rubbish, either directly on the ground or in a hole.


There are an estimated 500 landfills in the UK. In the UK in 2018 we generated 44 million tonnes of waste. England alone was responsible for a significant 84% of that. In 2019 the total rose to 45.8 million tonnes. Recycling is a good way to reduce how much waste goes to landfill and then means that used materials can be re-used or repurposed.


It is important to separate waste properly, because an estimated 20% of recyclable material ends up in landfill due to it being contaminated by non-recyclable waste, which is caused by people using the wrong bins. You can check on your local council's website to see what they accept for recycling as it can differ per area.

The most common recycled material is paper, whereas the least common are juice cartons. This is because you usually cannot put them in the recycling bin, therefore making it inconvenient to recycle. ▶By Ryan Gillet (LEAP).

Brandon completed his health and safety induction with Fraser and he will be interviewed in January for a potential work placement on site. Brandon told Fraser " I've always wanted a job in construction and would like to try all the different trades to see which one I enjoy the most".

Owen has also secured a work placement with TecQuipment which is based in Nottingham and manufactures engineering equipment used by Universities and colleges around the world. Owen is researching the company's competitors and compiling a spreadsheet of detailed information on their products and prices. This will enable TecQuipment to remain the global market leader in this aspect of engineering.
