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Financial support is available for students who attend either Lakeside or LEAP College and meet eligibility criteria.

Vulnerable Student Bursary (aged 16-19 attending Lakeside College) An award of up to £1,200 per academic year for students who meet at least one of the below eligibility criteria:

- In Care
- Care Leaver
- In receipt of Income Support or Universal Credit because you are financially supporting yourself or financially supporting yourself and some who is dependent on you and living with you (i.e. a child or partner).
- In receipt of Disability Living Allowance (DLA) or Personal Independence Payments (PIP) and Employment Support Allowance (ESA) or Universal Credit in your own right.

Discretionary Bursary (age 16-25 attending Lakeside or LEAP College) Where household income is less that £25,000 applications for discretionary bursary will be considered. Applicants can apply for specific support related to their course (i.e. buying equipment, paying for trips etc.)

## Recycling - What do you need to know?

Recycling is an important way to help protect our world and reduce waste pollution. If people did not recycle at all we would have much more landfills and litter everywhere, and we would also run out of resources as we would not have any materials to use and repurpose. Did you know?

In 2019, it is estimated that over 1,400,000 tonnes of plastic packaging where used by UK Households

More than 285,000 tonnes, (6.28 billion) household plastic bottles are not recycled – which costs councils an estimated £24.3m to dispose of.

A pair of jeans can contain up to 8 repurposed plastic bottles

An estimated 13b plastic bottles are not recycled every year

Every year, an estimated 600m batteries are thrown away, and over 20,000 tonnes go to landfill

30 million tonnes of waste is generated in the UK every year, of which 5.9 million is packaging

The UK Produces over 9 billion drinks cans a year, of which 80% is made out of aluminium

The energy saved by recycling just one aluminium drinks can is enough to run a TV for up to three hours

Aluminium is the 2nd most used metal and one of the best to recycle.
