Wargrave House School & Sixth Form College were shortlisted as finalists for all three categories, the 'Breaking Barriers Award', the Outstanding Impact Award and the 'Innovation Award', demonstrating a consistent scope of expertise from all staff relating to Careers, Information Education and Guidance (CEIAG) as well as the Sundial Outreach Team. Sundial have gone above and beyond in providing outreach and transitioning complex placements for new learners who have previously been out of education for a significant amount of time.

On behalf of all our staff associated with the success, we're really pleased that our work is being recognised by NASS who are at the fore front of innovative practice, and I am exceptionally proud of all our learners, students and staff. Why We Won the 'Outstanding Impact Award' 2022





As we shared in the last Issue of our Newsletter, we were granted the 'Outstanding Impact Award' 2022. The event happened at the 2022 NASS Annual Conference held on the 6th & 7th of October 2022. After being shortlisted as finalists for the categories' Breaking Barriers Award', Outstanding Impact Award and the 'Innovation Award', we were nominated as a winner by the National Association of Special Schools (NASS).



Do you know why we are the best?



We were awarded the above Outstanding Impact Award mainly due to the work we have done around Outdoor Learning Education via the Duke of Edinburgh programme which has become an integral part of our school curriculum, We introduced the DofE Scheme in 2020, becoming a Directly Licensed Centre (DLC) in 2021-22. With the autonomy this brings, we are becoming a beacon for implementing SEND DofE programmes across the NW. Whilst also working with UK-wide DofE to support changes that will allow a more accessible DofE programme for all. **Proud winners**



Many of our learners have never previously stayed away from home, let alone experienced a camping trip. All these, including overnight expeditions, provide time and space for personal development, independence and self-esteem.

We provided much evidence that strongly shows the positive impact of the Duke of Edinburgh has on our students. Among them are documents explaining the impact, photographs showing the positive effect, a card written by a student, etc.

The card addressed to Nick was written by learner M spontaneously. The note reads: "I love your nature lessons and the trees'. After drawing a heart on the card, learner M gave it to the teacher. The message on this card shows how powerfully and positively outdoor education impact learners. It is so effective that it gets students like M, who are usually hesitant to complete written tasks to create a note like this



Learners also experience the opportunity for social interaction, confidence building, appropriate risk-taking, developing resilience and building upon the learner's environmental knowledge and interests. All these ventures also prepare our learners to become responsible citizens and live everyday lives as adults.

Other successful impacts we have on our learners are developing their employability skills, including confidence, resilience and teamwork. Young people have also discovered new passions and talents which can influence their future careers. Providing a challenging but inclusive opportunity through noncompetitive and achievable activities, regardless of ability, background, gender, race, religion or sexual orientation, we give them a chance to achieve their potential and develop their skills.

I hope you all have a lovely half-term holiday!




RISE 2



find out what you can recycle at home - check out your local council webrite to find out what you can put in your home recycling bins and whether you have a food and garden warte collection.

How to recycle

Check you have the right bin/. box. bag or caddy - mort council/ have hourehold recucling collections, so if you don't already have a recycling bin, box, bag or caddu you can contact your local authority to get them.

Check the date - find out from your local authority which day your recycling will be collected. Your recycling may be collected weekly, fortnightly or even monthly. Mark the date on a calendar or add a reminder to your phone.

find a place to store your recycling - now that you know which item/ you can recycle. find a place to store them before you take them out to the bin.

Make sure everyone in yous house knows - encourage family to check whether items can be reuzed or recycled before they are thrown away. Check roomz you might not think of, like the bathroom.

If you don't have a recycling collection at home find your nearest recycling drop-off point. These are often at big supermarkets but your local tip has them too.
